Dear Family,

Each January 3rd we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Name of *Jesus*. What a perfect beginning to the New Year!

Jesus. The Catechism of the Catholic Church, in paragraph 2668, reminds us that "the invocation of the Holy Name of Jesus is the simplest way of praying always."

Jesus. St. Bernard of Clairvaux once said that the Name of Jesus is "*light, and food, and medicine*." It is *light*, for the Holy Name scatters our darkness. It is *food*, for we are nourished by the grace, consolation, and protection of the Holy Name. It is *medicine*, for when we invoke the Holy Name of Jesus we receive healing and peace.

Jesus. In this Name is our confidence and our hope. As we say this Name, as we pray this Name, we invoke and call upon Our Lord. The Catechism assures us: "The name 'Jesus' contains all: God and man and the whole economy of creation and salvation. ... His name is the only one that contains the presence it signifies" (paragraph 2666).

In our modern day, very sadly, it is a common occurrence to hear the Holy Name of *Jesus* spoken with irreverence, taken in vain, or used as an exclamation of anger, disgust, or surprise. This happens on television, on the radio, in print, in the workplace, and even in our own homes. While many may do this out of ignorance or thoughtless habit, still it grieves the hearts of those who know the power, beauty, and significance of the Holy Name.

Therefore, Family, whenever we hear the Holy Name taken in vain, let us offer a silent prayer of reparation to Our Lord. Let us also offer a prayer of intercession for the one who misuses the Name of *Jesus*, asking Our Lord to convert their hearts through the power of the Holy Name. Let us pray for the salvation and sanctification of the whole world through the power of the Holy Name. Each January, tens of thousands of people gather in the nation's capital during the coldest month of the year. Many of them travel hundreds of miles and take time away from school or work. Sometimes, they walk for hours in the falling snow.

Why do so many make these sacrifices? They do this to join together in defense of the most vulnerable among us – the unborn – at the March for Life.

While most news outlets ignore or pay little attention to the annual event, EWTN is on the ground with daylong coverage.

Abigail Galván, the host of *EWTN Pro-Life Weekly*, will be one of the hosts of EWTN's March for Life coverage this year. While many people say that abortion is a women's-rights issue, she sees it in a different light. "The pro-life movement, at its core, is about women. Women are being lied to, and they're the ones having to pay the price," says Galván. "I [want to] shine Christ's light into the situation and help women recover their dignity and worth."



A Patron of Youth

St. John Bosco

"Do you want to do a good deed? Teach the young! Do you want to perform a holy act? Teach the young! Do you want to do a holy thing? Teach the young! Truly, now and for the future, among holy things, this is the holiest." – St. John Bosco

John Bosco was not an obvious choice to become a priest.

He came from a family of farmers, while priests usually came from wealthier families. His father died when he was only two, and his brother discouraged him in his studies. Yet, in spite of the obstacles, John Bosco not only became a priest but also founded an order, the Society of Saint Francis de Sales (commonly known as the Salesians of Don Bosco), to aid young people, especially the poor. Due to his care for children, he is now one of the patrons of youth.

When he was only nine, John Bosco had a prophetic dream that set the course for his future work. In his memoirs, he recalled that in this dream poor boys were speaking blasphemies. A man then appeared, saying, "You will have to win these friends of yours not with blows, but with gentleness and kindness. So begin right now to show them that sin is ugly and virtue beautiful."

Soon afterward, the future saint discovered a clever way to evangelize the kids he knew. John Bosco studied traveling jugglers, acrobats, and other entertainers and then gave his own performances, during which he prayed with the children and taught them about the Faith.

A pious young man, John Bosco wanted to become a priest but didn't have the money for an education. However, with the combined efforts of his mother, a young priest who saw his potential, and his own money from working odd jobs, he was able to complete the seminary.

Upon ordination in 1841, he acquired the title "Don," an honorific for priests in Italy. As a young priest, he walked the streets of Turin, where he found countless children who were poor, dirty, and starving. This led him to create

his Oratory, or youth center, that helped many children, both in practical ways and with their spiritual lives. Later, he founded the Society of Saint Francis de Sales, with the primary purpose of helping boys, as well as a similar organization for girls, the Daughters of Mary, Help of Christians. Today, both groups are active around the world with thousands of members.

For Don Bosco, love was at the heart of his mission. He wanted young people to know that they were loved by him and mostly by God. He fought for their dignity, trying to end their abuse and mistreatment. He gave them instructions and helped with their basic needs. More importantly, he taught them about the Faith and encouraged them to live moral lives. He said to them, "Run, jump, have all the fun you want at the right time, but, for Heaven's sake, do not commit sin!"

Don Bosco was beloved by the children, and his influence was obvious. The boys flourished with his help. In fact, one of his students, Dominic Savio, was later canonized.

St. John Bosco teaches that children are to be loved and valued. They should learn about the Lord on their terms, even if that means with acrobatics and magic tricks. And he teaches us that, no matter our work for the Kingdom of God, we should *Servite Domino in laetitia!* – Serve the Lord joyfully!

The Influence of a Holy Mother

This beloved saint owes a great deal to his mother, Margaret Occhiena Bosco. After being widowed at age 29, she raised her three boys strongly in the Faith. Later, when Don Bosco was helping the children in Turin, she was at his side, helping to care for them. The boys even referred to her as "Mama Bosco." In 2006, Pope Benedict named her Venerable.

O Jesus, who has said, "Heaven and earth shall pass away but My word shall not pass away," through the intercession of Mary Your Most Holy Mother, I feel confident that my prayer will be granted.
